

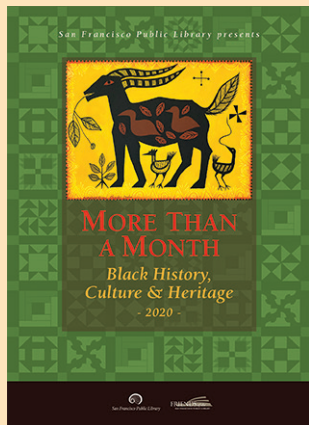

### For Adults

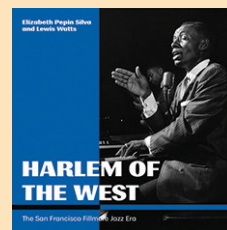

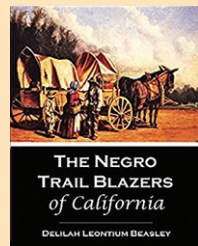

Celebrating the 100-year anniversary of Delilah Beasley's *The Negro Trail Blazers of California*, Virginia Smyly, of the San Francisco African American Historical and Cultural Society, and Shawna Sherman, of the African American Center, will lead a discussion on her life and highlight early Black San Francisco pioneers.

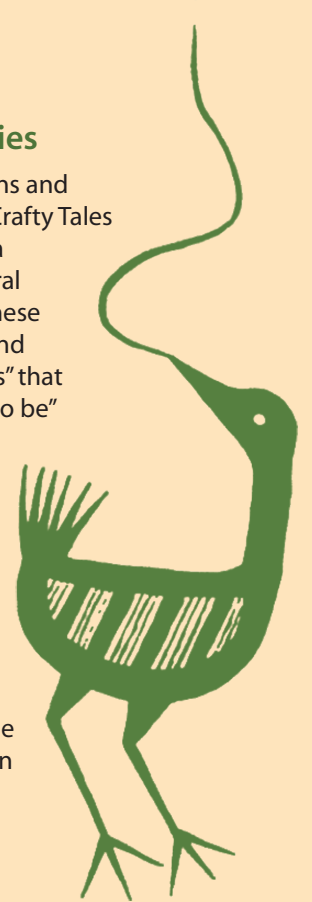

## Celebrate Bay Area Science Fiction and Fantasy at the Main

**SF by the Bay**, the Main Library's grand celebration of Bay Area science fiction and fantasy opens on Feb. 1 and continues through April 30. In partnership with SF in SF, Borderlands Books, *Locus* magazine, Tachyon Publications, AfroSurreal Writers Workshop, Consonance and other organizations, SF by the Bay presents more than 30 programs, including film screenings, author talks, live dramas, lectures, panel discussions, a filk music concert, book displays, a costume contest and an exhibit of rare books, magazines and art drawn from the Library's J. Francis McComas Fantasy and Science Fiction Collection, a reference collection of more than 3,000 books and magazines. SF by the Bay highlights the region's important contributions to the history of fantasy and science fiction and celebrates its international and multimedia contexts.

The exhibition is particularly relevant today in light of the current assault on voting rights. Although Martin Luther King Jr., Ralph Bunche, Rabbi Abraham Heschel and many other notables led the initial 4,000 protesters onto Highway 80 heading to Montgomery, the march was really the creation and expression of ordinary people.

"I'm delighted to bring this exhibition to San Francisco so that the public can experience what it was like to take part in an historic demonstration that drew Americans from all corners of the country and all walks of life," says Herron. "I hope a visit will inspire the same sense of unity felt then."

## *I'm Walkin' For My Freedom: The Selma March and Voting Rights*

2020 marks the 55th anniversary of the Selma to Montgomery March for voting rights. The spirit on Thursday morning March 25, 1965 was triumphant as more than 25,000 marchers prepared for their entrance into Montgomery. Making its San Francisco debut, *I'm Walkin'* features 40 black and white digital pigment prints taken by Marin resident Matt Herron during the seminal march, which resulted directly in the passage of the Voting Rights Act.

## Talking with Kids about Race and Racism

**A**pologies can come with the expectation that all will be forgiven, but without accounting for the lasting damage of the offense, the need for accountability and inherent and historical power inequities, "sorry" is often not enough.

This workshop will help you talk with kids about reparations and accountability, how expectations of forgiveness can burden people who are wronged and what Indigenous, Black and other families of color need in the pursuit of justice. Keynote speakers Alison Collins, Gabriela Lopez and Mariposa will explore these issues. Afterwards, participants will continue the conversation in small discussion groups

# Collections and Services

## Spotlight on e-Resources in Chinese

**D**id you know you can download your favorite Chinese e-books and e-magazines to your digital device and read them while you are on vacation or at home? Check out these SFPL online resources—United Daily News (UDN), Kono and Qikan—to start your reading journey.

UDN is an app that offers eBooks and news in traditional Chinese characters. Subject areas include health, business, Chinese history, travel and language learning. UDN also includes fiction, including romance, suspense, Kung Fu and other collections for children and young adults.

Kono is an app that provides more than 200 full-color high-quality digital magazines from Hong Kong and Taiwan in Chinese (traditional characters). Patrons can access a wide variety of content ranging from entertainment to science and technology, to fashion, to home and design and to travel.

Qikan is a database that has 200 current, popular Chinese language magazines published in mainland China. Subject areas cover a variety of topics, including current events, literature, technology, marketing, health and education.

There are many free Chinese e-resources to explore. Please visit a librarian if you need assistance.



## Must Read Sci-Fi by Bay Area Authors

These exciting science fiction titles are featured in the *SF by the Bay* exhibit (Feb.–April 2020) in the Main Library's General Collections & Humanities Center (3rd Floor). The exhibit displays significant works by local authors drawn from the Library's J. Francis McComas Fantasy and Science Fiction Collection.

### ***Dune* by Frank Herbert**

One of the best-selling and most influential science fiction novels of all time, Herbert's stirring space opera teems with adventure, political intrigue and religious conflict.

### ***Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?* by Philip K. Dick**

In a future where robots are almost indistinguishable from humans, bounty hunter Rick Deckard assists the San Francisco Police in locating and "retiring" six androids that escaped from off-world colonies.

### ***The Left Hand of Darkness* by Ursula K. Le Guin**

In LeGuin's landmark novel, Genly Ai is a Black man from Earth sent to an ice-bound planet of gender-fluid beings in order to convince them to join a coalition of humanoid-ruled planets.

### ***The Last Unicorn* by Peter S. Beagle**

Beagle's 1968 "soft fantasy" novel tells the story of a unicorn who sets out to find others like herself after she overhears she is the last of her kind.

### ***Rocket to the Morgue* by Anthony Boucher**

This genre-blending locked-room mystery novel come science fiction roman à clef features legendary figures in the science fiction community, including Robert Heinlein, L. Ron Hubbard and Jack Parsons.

### ***The Old Drift* by Namwali Serpell**

Combining historical fiction, magical realism and science fiction, Serpell's acclaimed debut novel takes readers on an amazing journey through past, present and future Zambia.

### ***The New Voices of Science Fiction* edited by Hannu Rajaniemi and Jacob Weisman**

A fascinating anthology of short stories by diverse up-and-coming authors.

### ***Autonomous* by Annalee Newitz**

Newitz's award-winning debut novel is set in a post-plague landscape dominated by Big Pharma and follows the adventures of anti-patent scientist Jack and his military and robotic pursuers.

## Reading Afrofuturism

Afrofuturism, a term coined by critic Mark Dery in his essay "Black to the Future," is a blend of the African Diaspora with science, philosophy and technology. Explore visions of the future with the SFPL Afrofuturism booklist, created in connection with More Than a Month and SF By the Bay.



### ***An Unkindness of Ghosts* by Rivers Solomon**

A shipbound colony, led by a group of brutal zealots, is divided along racial lines, with those of darker skin performing the majority of the labor under a ruthless police state. Heroine Aster learns there may be a way to improve her lot—if she's willing to sow the seeds of civil war.



### ***Who Fears Death* by Nnedi Okorafor**

Born into post-apocalyptic Africa to a mother who was raped after the slaughter of her entire tribe, Onyesonwu is tutored by a shaman and discovers that her magical destiny is to end the genocide of her people.



### ***Dhalgren* by Samuel R. Delany**

Journeying to the central U.S. city of Bellona, where moat have fled, a poet and adventurer known only as the Kid wonders at the strange portents that appear in the city's cloud-covered sky.



### ***How Long 'til Black Future Month?* by N. K. Jemisin**

Jemisin sharply examines modern society, infusing magic into the mundane, and draws deft parallels in the fantasy realms of her imagination.



### ***The Prey of Gods* by Nicky Drayden**

In this genre-bending, science fantasy set in 2064, newly awakened demigods and artificial intelligences battle for the fate of South Africa.

## Violins of Hope Comes to the Bay Area



From Jan. 16 through March 14, Burlingame's Music at Kohl Mansion will host Violins of Hope San Francisco Bay Area, an immersive eight-week celebration of the remarkable resilience of the human spirit. Through a series of programs collaboratively presented by more than 40 diverse Bay Area organizations in eight counties, Violins of Hope SFBA will showcase 50 string instruments once played by Jews in concentration camps during the Holocaust. Lovingly restored by Israeli violin-makers Amnon and Avshalom Weinstein, the violins are now touring worldwide. This first West Coast appearance of the instruments commemorates the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz.

The San Francisco Public Library presents two programs in conjunction with Violins of Hope SFBA in the Main Library's Koret Auditorium.

Musicians have been sharing melodies for centuries with no regard to political and national boundaries. Join four internationally renowned Bay Area musicians steeped in seemingly separate cultural musical traditions with an exciting and surprising common vision of musical sharing.

**Film: Violins of Hope: Strings of the Holocaust** – Feb. 7, 3–4:30 p.m., Koret Auditorium

This documentary film features Israeli violin maker Amnon Weinstein and his efforts to restore violins recovered from the Holocaust. Some were played by Jewish prisoners in concentration camps; others belonged to the Klezmer musical culture, which was all but destroyed by the Nazis. Narrated by Academy Award-winner Adrien Brody.

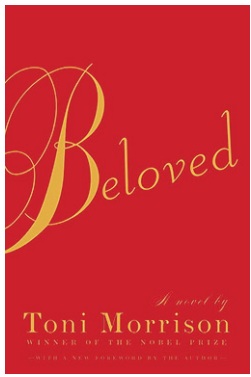

**Earle McCartney's** short stories have appeared in *ZZYZVA*, *The Common*, *Meridian*, *Big Fiction* and *The Greensboro Review*. He received an MFA from the Iowa Writers' Workshop and was a recipient of The San Francisco Foundation's 2013 Joseph Henry Jackson Award. A native of rural southern New Jersey, Earle has lived in San Francisco for the last twelve years.

**Amanda Moore's** poetry has appeared in journals and anthologies including *ZZYZVA*, *Cream City Review* and *Best New Poets*, and her essays have appeared in *The Baltimore Review*, *Hippocampus Magazine* and on the University of Arizona Poetry Center's blog. She is a Contributing Poetry Editor at *Women's Voices for Change*, a Board member for the Marin Poetry Center and a high school teacher. Amanda lives by the beach in the Outer Sunset with her husband and daughter.

**Mia Paschal** is an actress and playwright who moved to San Francisco from Milan, Italy to study with Ed Hooks. Along with her ensemble theater and film work, she has written and performed four award-winning solo shows: *some life*, *This Lily Was (Fontana)*, *Along the Path of Larks and Swallow* and *Heartbreak Velocity*. The San Francisco Museum of Modern Art and the Oakland Museum of California have also commissioned her to write site-specific works, *My Jim Dine Valentine* and *Trevlig*. Writing in Italian, French, Danish and English, her poetry will next be featured in the winter issue of *The Copenhagen Review*.

**Maddy Raskulinecz** is a fiction writer from Maryland, now living in San Francisco. Her fiction has appeared in *ZZYZVA*, *Guernica*, *Joyland*, *Tin House Online* and elsewhere, and was recently included in *The Best American Nonrequired Reading 2019*. She holds an MFA from Johns Hopkins University.

Last year's Brown Handler Residents published their first books, received offers from literary agents, published in national publications including the *New York Times* and *Departures* magazine and presented their work at the Friends' Lit Crawl Event in at the Mission Branch Library.
