Facing Life: Eight Stories of Life after Life in California's Prisons

Hear Pendarvis Harshaw and Brandon Tauszik in conversation with Nigel Poor and Earlonne Woods, our 17th One City One Book authors. Joining the conversation is Lynn Acosta, one of the participants of *Facing Life*, who shares her story.

Lynn Acosta

Facing Life is a multimedia web-based project that chronicles the experiences of eight individuals living through reentry after serving life prison sentences in California. The visuals are by Brandon Tauszik, and the essay by Pendarvis Harshaw.

Over the course of two years, Tauszik and Harshaw followed these individuals as they faced everyday challenges, entered the workforce and tried to readjust to today's rapidly changing way of

life. Facing Life is comprised of cinemagraphs, videos, 360VR clips and text, giving an intimate and extensive look into their lives.


Harshaw is a renowned journalist and educator based in Sacramento and Oakland. Tauszik is a documentary photographer and filmmaker based in Los Angeles and Oakland.

Sara Kruzan and co-author Cori Thomas discuss I Cried to Dream Again: Trafficking, Murder, and Deliverance, Kruzan's story as a survivor of childhood abuse and sex trafficking. This gripping memoir is the disturbing and ultimately empowering story of her journey from abuse to incarceration without

parole for killing her abuser to finally gaining her liberation.

Kruzan is an American activist and survivor of sex trafficking.

She is an advocate for sentencing reform and the human rights of incarcerated women and children, and the inspiration behind Sara's Law, a bill currently in the House of Representatives seeking to protect children of abuse from facing life sentences. Thomas is an author, a screenwriter and an award-winning playwright.

Consumer Reports Helps Answer Your Tech Buying Questions



he holiday season is here, and along with looking forward to connecting with family and friends, it is also a time of gift giving. Anything tech-related, from an excellent pair of wireless headphones, to a smart phone, to an air fryer, would be a welcome present for many people. The challenge with trying to buy the right tech is knowing what is available and how to evaluate quality.

A good place to look for answers is the Consumer Reports Buying Guide, which you can access at *sfpl.org* under the Research and Learn tab—>eMagazines & eNews—>eMagazines—>Flipster Digital Magazines (EBSCO). The buying guide contains numerous reports ranking consumer products from washers and dryers to cell phones and everything in between. It also includes cost comparisons, user ratings and tips on how to evaluate quality based on your preferred criteria.

The guide is broken up into specific sections that can be linked to through the table of contents and provides highly visual charts for patrons who become easily overwhelmed with online buying guides and their endless technical specs.

As an example, the cell phone section contains a chart listing brand and model, overall score, price, survey results, test results and features. Almost every iPhone and Android model is represented, and it is possible to compare them in order to make an informed choice.

If you are blind or have low vision, view the guide with someone who can visually make sense of the information shown, as the tables and charts are not laid out in a way that makes sense to a screen reader user.

While you are exploring the buying guide, go ahead and check out any other exciting magazine or database that catches your attention at *sfpl.org/databases*. There are literally hundreds of digital spaces to explore. Happy gift hunting and happy holidays!

Located in study room 540 on the 5th floor of the Main Library, the Lab is available Sundays, 12:30–3:30 p.m. and Tuesdays, 2–5 p.m., by appointment for individual, 3-hour sessions.

A Digi Center staff member will check you in and get you started with the equipment so that you can independently digitize and save your items. From there, your personal digital archive is yours to preserve and share with family, friends and community.




Spotlight on Homelessness
