

Stage Adaptation of Middle Grade Novel Tours SFPL

an Francisco Youth Theatre (SFYT) is thrilled to present a touring production of Dyana Díaz's adaptation of local authors Alma Flor Ada and Gabriel Zubizaretta's novel Dancing Home (Simon & Schuster).

Meet Margie and Lupe, two fifthgrade cousins who learn about family, dancing and themselves. Margie is proud to be born in the United States. Her family is from Mexico and her cousin, Lupe, arrives in California to live with her. As Lupe struggles with a new country and language, Margie is asked to help her adjust. The cousins' relationship becomes

turbulent as Margie is faced with questions about her own heritage and identity and Lupe learns of her father who left the family in Mexico years before. Side by side, through a shared love of dancing, Margie and Lupe embark on a journey of self-discovery, love and family.

Founded in 2014 by director Emily Klion, SFYT offers year-round skill-building classes, performance ensembles and internships for youth ages 4-24 to form an inclusive community of young creatives.

Poetry and Local Art Pops Up at the Hormel

he James C. Hormel LGBTQIA Center is hosting a newly created, intimate exhibition titled I Still Love You: Queerness, Ancestors and the Places That Made Us curated by local queer women of color artists Tina Bartolome and Natalia M. Vigil. Opening March 18, the exhibition juxtaposes poetry and art from 16 BIPOC Bay Area artists with archival treasures and literary selections from the Hormel Center's collections.

What makes this exhibition so unique is its evolutionary journey. In spring 2022, the Hormel Center hosted Kaleidoscope, a creative writing workshop, created by community-based arts



organizations Still Here San Francisco and Queer Ancestor Project. Simple yet groundbreaking, the workshop paired queer and transgender and gender nonconforming (TGNC) transitional-aged youth with older queer and TGNC teaching artists to develop original work. At the workshop's culminating performance, it became clear to Cristina Mitra, Hormel Center program manager, that the artists' work deserved a broader audience in the form of an exhibition. Leaning into the workshop's themes of ancestry, love and family in all its manifestations, Bartolome and Vigil dove into the Hormel Center archives and hand-selected photographs, diaries and ephemera that overtly and subtly conversed with the young artists' work.

In addition to the Kaleidoscope workshop pieces, more than ten different collections from the Hormel Center's LGBTQIA archives will be on display—some never exhibited—including the sublime black-and-white portraits by Robert Giard and Lynda Koolish and selections from the Barbara Cameron papers, the Jewelle Gomez papers, the collection on Sylvester and much more.



Find Essential Government Information with Leadership Connect



FPL now subscribes to **Leadership Connect**, a new online tool to help you find the right people, bills, lobbying firms and much more in state, local and federal government. With its uncluttered interface and color-coded navigation menu, this user-friendly database guides you to government contacts and other information quickly.

Leadership Connect offers a familiar online browsing experience. Explore LinkedIn-like profiles to help track people as they move across different areas of government throughout their career. Use the search box at the top of the page to locate names, roles or legislation.

Leadership Connect replaces the *Congressional Yellow Book*, the discontinued print directory of Congress, which mainly included committees and key staff. While these "yellow pages" served their purpose well for many years, the online successor outperforms them on every level by offering a continuously accurate, current and comprehensive knowledge base for the dynamic political landscape.

Other helpful features include daily news feeds, custom briefings and updates from official social media accounts. You can also print or save customized government organization charts as a PDF or image, and email individual profiles to yourself.

Collections Corner:



A Photo Curator Favorite for HERstory: Agnes Fay Photograph Album

gnes Fay, born in Ireland in 1888, immigrated to the United States in 1905. Fay trained to be a nurse at the French Hospital on Geary Street in the early 1910s. During World War I, Fay served in the United States Army as a nurse from 1918 to 1919. Upon returning from the war, Fay lived in the Richmond District and worked as a registered nurse at the French Hospital. In 1922, Fay traveled to Hawaii and stayed there for a year. On her return to San Francisco, Fay continued to work as a nurse through the 1940s for the Central Emergency Hospital. She never married.

The photograph album assembled by Fay documents her San Francisco life, friends and family between 1914 and 1943, including her travels to Hawaii. A bulk of the photos show the nurses, doctors and patients at the French Hospital. The album also depicts her time in Europe as a WW I U.S. Army nurse and includes many souvenir portraits of soldiers inscribed to Fay. Visit the San Francisco History Center to view this archival gem. White gloves provided.

Award-Winning Author Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai

The Library is honored to partner with Diasporic Vietnamese Artists Network (DVAN) and The Ruby SF to host internationally bestselling author

Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai in celebration of her new book, Dust Child, a story of broken families across continents and decades. Dust Child brings together an American GI, a Vietnamese woman and an Amerasian man who grew up in an orphanage, all seeking closure decades after the Vietnam War.

Born and raised in Viet Nam, Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai is the author of The Mountains Sing, runner-up for the 2021 Dayton Literary Peace Prize and the 2021 International Book Awards, the 2021 PEN Oakland/Josephine Miles Literary Award, among others. She has published twelve books of poetry, fiction and nonfiction. Her writing has been translated into twenty languages. She is an advocate for the rights of disadvantaged groups in Viet Nam.
